INITIATIVE SUMMARY


The Community Collaboration for Children's Success (CCCS) initiative aims to create better lives for children and youth in San Mateo County by identifying barriers to success and interventions in high-need neighborhoods.

The CCCS planning process will take place in South San Francisco between May and December 2018. A parallel process will take place in North Fair Oaks and parts of Redwood City during the same time period. Two more CCCS planning processes will take place between September 2018 and April 2019 in East Palo Alto and Daly City.

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HOW CAN I GET INVOLVED?

There will be many opportunities for you to be involved, even given time constraints.

Neighborhood residents/community members will provide input on community aspirations, barriers/issues, strengths, and needs, as well as potential programs, policy and systems changes, and practices through a range of community engagement opportunities.

Both neighborhood residents and community stakeholders can also be more engaged in the planning process by serving on the Neighborhood Leadership Group and/or as a Neighborhood Champion.

	Who Will Participate?	What Will They Do?
Neighborhood Leadership Group (NLG)	Each NLG will include local stakeholders from community-based organizations, service providers, and government agencies, as well as some Neighborhood Champions.	 Make recommendations based on their expertise. Share information about the CCCS planning process with other community members. Act as a liaison between the planning process and their organization or agency. Attend 4 meetings (approximately in June, July, Sept/Oct, and Nov/Dec 2018).
Neighborhood Champions	Champions may be resident leaders <u>or</u> other people with strong existing relationships with neighborhood residents (e.g., faith leader, trusted service provider).	 Make recommendations based on their expertise. Share information about the CCCS planning process with other community members. Help gather information from diverse residents to inform the neighborhood plans. Attend 1 meeting and 1 training on data collection tools (both in July 2018).
