BACHAC Announces Grant for Health Initiative!

The Public Health Institute (PHI)'s Together Towards Health program awarded a grant for a

new project to the Bay Area Community Health Advisory Council (BACHAC). BACHAC's Social Health Equity Project will use an equity lens to assess the Community Health Needs Assessments reports of non-profit hospital systems in San Mateo County. BACHAC will also conduct a community town hall to share results and seek community input on findings. BACHAC will then work with health care systems, clinics, and other stakeholders to identify 1-2 policy solutions to address the health needs of San Mateo County's communities. Learn more here.

Education leaders attended the meeting to discuss disparities in school discipline. These disparities have the most negative impact on Latinx, Black, and Pacific Islander students. Advancing Equitable Access to Nature

Your family can qualify to get a Free Annual Park Pass to explore nature! The San Mateo County Board of Supervisors approved the Mariposa Program. This program provides low-income families free access to parks.

Many underserved communities have no safe access to open spaces within walking distance. Under the Mariposa Program, entrance fees are waived for over 20 public parks. You qualify if you receive CalFresh, WIC, or Medi-Cal.

BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS VACANCIES

There are multiple boards and commissions vacancies for the City of San Bruno, City of Menlo Park, and City of Redwood City.

City of San Bruno: The City of San Bruno has one vacant seat on their Parks and Recreation Commission. The Parks and Recreation Commission makes recommendations to the City Council regarding community recreation need. Deadline to apply is February 28.

City of Redwood City: The City of Redwood City is holding a special recruitment to fill two partial-term vacancies on the Planning Commission, one seat expiring June 30, 2024, and the other seat expiring June 30, 2026. Eligible community members who are interested in sharing their knowledge and experience to help shape City programs and policies are encouraged to apply. Deadline to apply is February 28.

City of Menlo Park: The City of Menlo Park has vacancies on their advisory bodies: two seats on Complete Streets, two seats on Environmental Quality, one seat on Housing, two seats on Parks and Recreation, and two seats on Planning. Each advisory commission establishes an annual work plan that is in line with the City Council's goals, which guides the commissions' activities and projects. Deadline to apply is April 7.
